Lights-Out Hour DC on March 25

*HRS advocates for the environmental and health benefits of "dark skies" and urges members to participate in Lights-Out Hour DC. This is a voluntary event in which individual residents, building managers and custodians of public monuments in the District of Columbia dim or extinguish nonessential lights for one hour from 8:30-9:30 pm on March 25, 2023. The purpose of the event, which coincides with internationally observed Earth Hour, is to raise public awareness of climate change and the impact of light pollution on human health and the environment.

In particular, in Council testimony and public comments CHRS has supported responsible streetlights on Maryland Avenue NE and

Pennsylvania Avenue SE. Features of responsible lighting include shielding streetlights to prevent light trespass upwards while still allowing for street level illumination levels needed for public safety, and using bulbs with Kelvin color scores of 2,700 or lower (lights with warm-toned yellow-white lights), that are healthier for humans. This is in contrast with blue-white bulbs that emit light at 4,000 Kelvin or higher because the short wavelengths scatter both within the human eye and in the atmosphere, increasing sky-glow. The American Medical Association states that streetlights set for 4,000 Kelvin are potentially harmful to human health.

Please join us in thinking about how lights affect our neighborhood on March 25. ★

Historic Preservation Briefs

The Historic Preservation Review Board (HPRB or the Board) considered the following cases at its virtual hearing on January 26, 2023. HPRB is responsible for determining if proposed changes to a building are consistent with the DC Preservation Act. A "concept review" is a preliminary determination of a building owner's plan to alter the building, and if the concept is approved, the owner will return to the HPRB for a final review.

637 A Street SE, HPA 23-101, concept/construct two-story garage/apartment. The applicants plan to demolish an existing garage and replace it with a two-story building: garage on the first story and an apartment on the second story. There are already a number of two-story buildings near this project, including Brown's Court.

The Board has often allowed demolition of existing garages without inquiring into their date of construction. The new building will be clad in brick. The alley elevation would have a roll top garage door, aluminum-clad exterior door, one aluminum-clad double-hung window on the first story, brick sills and headers, three more windows on the second story and an Azek cornice.

The yard-facing elevation would have aluminum-clad French doors and a double-hung window on the first story and three additional windows on the second story. At 20 feet tall, it would be within the height limit. We believed that the design and materials were appropriate. The Board found the project compatible with the Capitol Hill historic district and delegated authority to HPO Staff. Vote: 5-0.

On January 26, the Board approved the following case on the consent calendar:

• **531 12th Street SE**, HPA 23-090. The applicant submitted revised plans addressing the concerns of HPRB, CHRS and ANC 6B. For prior coverage see CHRS *News* February 2023. ★
